The sawtooth sequence starts out the same as the diatonic 3rds (1-3) but then goes up one scale step and back down a diatonic 3rd: 1-3-4-2, 3-5-6-4, 5-7-1(8)-6, etc., when ascending, and 1(8)-6-5-7, 6-4-3-5, 4-2-1-3, etc., when descending. You can rack up a lot of melodic mileage by combining these 3rds sequences with other scale patterns and modes.

LESSON Because the only difference between the Melodic Minor and The Major Scale is one note - the flat 3 - the scale patterns are also similar. So be sure to notice where they are different. You would use the same patterns for the Melodic Minor modes as well but of course, the tonal centre (root note) will change.

Pattern 1 starts on the first note of the scale, Pattern 2 starts on the second note of the scale, and so on. All of the patterns start from the sixth string, and the white dots in each scale pattern indicate the root of the scale.

In the last tetrachord lesson we went over the concept of tetrachords and how they change the way we think about scale patterns. In that lesson the focus was the major modes and a question was posted asking about the melodic minor and harmonic minor modes. Therefore this week's article will go over tetrachords in the melodic minor and how those also apply to the harmonic minor.

### Lesson: Minor Tetrachord Patterns - No Treble

Many scale-sequence patterns can also be applied to triads and basic 7th arpeggios. FIGURE 7 ascends the G major scale via a sawtooth sequence of harmonized triads. The pattern simply rolls up one triad (from the root) and then down the other (from the 5th), in diatonic succession (G-Am-Bm-C-D-Em-B<sup>7</sup>) up the scale pattern. FIGURE 7

In the D major scale the F would be sharp as well but true to the melodic minor scale pattern, the third note is flattened from F# to F. Summary. We have looked at the construction of the melodic minor scale and compared the fundamental differences between the major scale and the melodic minor scale to help us learn.

The secret to playing a melodic banjo G-major scale is to relocate the fretted notes in the tab to a lower string on your banjo (these are notes two, four, six, and seven of the G-major scale). You can then play different strings consecutively as you climb up the scale, using right-hand roll patterns that are related to Scruggs's rolls.
